Fieldwork January – September 2015

Dr. Cristiana Zara and Dr. Sophie Hadfield-Hill are based in India for a nine month period conducting fieldwork. It has been an extremely busy and fruitful first few months.

The **key stakeholders** have been involved in the fieldwork from the outset, from the development of the mobile app to discussions of outputs from the project and useable data. Community and school based **ethnography** began from day one; the researchers are getting to know, being seen and integrating into everyday life.

Research has begun in four of the local schools, children have been invited to participate in the project and the researchers have asked the children to **draw** their local area to be used as a prompt for the first interview. The 'All About You' **interviews** are underway, leading to other interviews and methodologies. The researchers have also been on **guided walks** with key project stakeholders; attended community engagement workshops with residents from the local area and have planned a **school bus ethnography.**

Building Smart Child-Friendly Cities event

Sophie was invited as an international participant to the 'Building Smart Child-Friendly Cities for 21st Century India' event to share best practice in the planning for India's vision for 100 new 'smart' cities. The event was hosted by the Bernard Van Leer Foundation, Ministry of Urban Development, National Institute of Urban Affairs and School of Planning and Architecture, New Delhi (November 2014).



Local young person advisory group

The app has now been launched in the case study area and we are excited to see data emerging.
